KOREAN WAR ARMISTICE DAY

WHEREAS, the Korean War was fought from June 25, 1950 through July 27, 1953; and

WHEREAS, more than 1.5 million American men and women served in the Korean War; and

WHEREAS, the Korean War was one of the bloodiest wars in history, with more than 34,000 Americans killed in action, approximately 103,000 wounded, and more than 8,000 missing; and

WHEREAS, more than 294,000 Floridians wore the uniform of the Armed Forces of the United States during the war; and

WHEREAS, Florida is currently home to more than 169,000 Korean War veterans; and

WHEREAS, the Korean War has been referred to as the "forgotten" war and has often been overlooked by historians, as well as the American people; and

WHEREAS, it is important to continue to promote recognition of the Korean War by providing the American public with a clearer understanding of the lessons, history, and legacy of the war and its veterans; and

WHEREAS, it is fitting that all Floridians honor America's Korean War veterans, through whose service and sacrifice we today enjoy freedom and liberty; and

WHEREAS, July 27, 2011 we commemorate the 58th anniversary of the end of the Korean War with the signing of the cease-fire on that date.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Rick Scott, Governor of the State of Florida, do hereby extend greetings and best wishes to all observing July 27, 2011 as *Korean War Armistice Day*.
